The MTCP emphasises on the development of human resources through the provision of trainings in various areas which are essential for a country's development such as the public administration, good governance, health, education, agriculture, sustainable development, poverty alleviation, economy and finance, ICT and environment.

Annually, Malaysia offered more than 65 capacity-building and technical assistance programmes under the MTCP, which have benefited more than 34,000 participants from 144 countries.

- Government officials involve in tourism development planning, promotion and marketing, particularly on cultural heritage tourism.
- Policy-makers, planners and decision-makers in tourism.
- Practitioners who are responsible for developing product and packages.
- Those involved in 'Visit' campaigns and destination marketing of tourism events

APPLICATION GUIDELINES

- Application should be made using prescribed MTCP forms available at: mtcpcoms.kln.gov.my/mtcpcoms/online/list_course
- The application must be completed and endorsed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs / Focal Points responsible for the MTCP Programme in the applicant's country, then submitted through the applicant's government with Note Verbale to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Malaysia via the nearest Malaysian High Commission / Embassy.
- Incomplete and/or unendorsed forms will not be processed.
- Online training link will be sent out via email to successful candidates.
- **Age:** Applicants should be between 26 to 50 years old.
- **Course Fee and Registration:** All course fees will be borne by the Malaysian Government under the MTCP.
- **Manners:** Participants shall conduct themselves at all times in a manner compatible with their responsibilities as MTCP participants and abide by the laws, rules and regulations as may be stipulated by the host government in respect of this training course.
- **Netiquette:** Netiquette guidelines are a set of rules that dictate what tasteful and respectful online behavior is. During lectures, male participants are required to dress in long-sleeved shirts with ties, long pants and lounge suits and female participants should be appropriately dressed in office attire. During practical, participants are required to dress in suitable attire for practical training. For formal occasions – lounge suit or national costume are required.

ABOUT THE COURSE

Almost every country in the world has tourism as among the primary contributors to its economy. Before the pandemic, international tourism has grown exponentially over the last 50 years and contributed to job creations and foreign revenues. The United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) reported that there were 1.5 billion international tourist arrivals in 2019 worldwide, and that figure indicates the tenth consecutive year of growth.

Cultural heritage tourism has long existed. The recent demographic, social, and cultural changes in the main source countries have led to an increasing number of new niche markets in destination countries, including culture-oriented holidays. Cultural heritage tourism is essential because:

- It brings a positive economic and social impact
- Establishes and reinforces the identity
- Helps preserve the cultural heritage and uniqueness of the community
- Facilitates harmony and understanding among people, and
- It supports culture and helps renew tourism.

Preserving and protecting culture and heritage is essential because the commodity to be offered must be secured for its sustainability. For this reason, the major challenge in tourism activities is ensuring that increased tourism does not destroy the very qualities that attract visitors in the first place.

Sustainable cultural tourism, driven by responsible tourism is the integrated management of cultural heritage and tourism activities in conjunction with the local community creating social, environmental, and economic benefits for all stakeholders.

It is crucial for any country or destinations that are dependent on tourism as one of the main contributing sectors in its economy to pay attention to this trending tourism alternative. It is because responsible tourism encourages people to make positive contributions to the conservation of cultural heritage which in return would help to provide better experiences for tourists through more meaningful connections with local communities. Responsible tourism promotes culturally sensitive tourists and hosts, encourage respects, and build local pride and confidence.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- To understand the concept of responsible tourism and its roles in the preservation and conservation of cultural heritage.
- To discover the responsibilities of local communities and the authorities in the conservation of cultural heritage.
- To uncover potential collaboration between local communities, authorities, and the private sector to develop and maintain a cultural heritage destination.
- To explore the digital technology's role in management and marketing of cultural heritage attractions; and
- Coordinate and facilitate cooperation between the government, community, and private sector of the participants' countries to promote responsible tourism to their respective stakeholders and communities as a collective initiative for sustainable destination management.
